Alpha Gamma members gathered at Hospitality House on December to serve a Christmas meal. One of the hits of the evening was Judith Geary's Cauliflower "Mac and Cheese." Several asked for the recipe so here is Judith's reinvention, in her words, of the classic Mac and Cheese!

Paleolithic Cauliflower Mac'n'Cheese

Recipe? Well, I started with fresh cauliflower (because it was on sale at Lowes), but you could use frozen. I microwaved each head of cauliflower in a covered glass dish for about 6-7 minutes, then let it cool enough to handle and chopped it up with a big knife. Each of those pans took two heads to fill with chopped cauliflower.

Next, I mixed in eggs, half n half and shredded "fiesta" cheese into the cauliflower. I scrambled the eggs and added half n half and shredded cheese. I was experimenting, but it ended up being nine eggs, about 3/4 c. half n half and a bit over half a pound of cheese for each pan to mix in with the cauliflower. I baked them for about 40 minutes at 350 degrees, covered in foil.

Then I used the rest of a two pound bag of shredded "fiesta" cheese and a half-pound bag of sharp cheddar to cover the pans, took them to HH and suggested they needed to be baked more.

That's about as close as I can come to a recipe. I realize for some people cooking is an art, and I admire that. I have a more "paleolithic" view of cooking, however: catch it, kill it, and heat it up so it's digestible.

Amy Anderson Receives DKG Groves-Little Endowment Grant

Mrs. Amy Anderson, who teaches science at the Williams Academy in Crossnore, recently received the North Carolina DKG Education Foundation Continuing Education for Professional/Personal Growth grant. Continuing education grants are awarded to individuals or to projects offering professional/personal growth for women educators through such educational activities as attendance at conferences or seminars, participation in independent studies, or educational travel.

As a new resident of North Carolina, Mrs. Anderson is learning more about the NC Standard Course of Study in Science thanks to this grant award. The grant allowed her to attend the North Carolina Science Teachers Conference. Attending this professional development opportunity enabled her to gain expertise, and it also increased her ability to network with other science teachers by establishing a support base. Gathering new ideas from the conference has motivated her to bring the magic of science into the daily classroom through activities such as "Robotics in the Classroom" and "NASCAR Incorporated into the Classroom!". The conference has provided her with a better understanding of the NCSCOS in Science as well as new strategies and techniques.



Amber Morgan Kimbro Receives DKG Groves-Little Endowment Grant

Ms. Amber Morgan Kimbro, a teacher in the Exceptional Children's department at Watauga High School, recently received the North Carolina DKG Education Foundation Groves-Little Endowment for Early Career Educators. She originally graduated from Appalachian State University and was one of their finalists for Student Teacher of the Year. She is a lifelong learner who is constantly searching for new and better techniques to improve her teaching and her students' success. This grant will allow her to continue working on her graduate degree.

The Groves-Little Endowment Grant for Early Career Educators may be initiated by individual educators who have taught four years or less and are employed in NC public schools. It covers a broad range of possibilities, focusing on two areas of importance for early career educators: Learning/Literacy projects for students in school or community settings and Continuing Education for Professional/Personal Growth through attendance at conferences, seminars, educational travel, and other educational activities. Ms. Kimbro received one of the two grants which were awarded in 2019-2020.

Alpha Gamma Chapter of NC DKG MINUTES Thursday, November 7, 2019 BREMCO Community Meeting Room

President Reese called the meeting to order at 5:30 welcoming attendees and introducing guests Andrew Wade, owner of Bubbles Carwash, and DKG Region IX Director, Becky Keesler. She also shared information about members unable to attend.

Susan Phipps hen presented a plaque to Andrew Wade to mark Alpha Gamma's first annual Friend of Education Award. Bubbles Carwash has generously donated gift cards for the Beginning Teachers Support project each year since its inception. President Reese announced that Alpha Gamma scholarship winners were recognized in the *Mountain Times* and the *Avery Journal* and that Alpha Gamma's support for the Watauga County Public Library was recognized in their November newsletter.

Next, Becky Keesler discussed the rewards of DKG membership and challenged members to find a broad spectrum of new members to bring into the chapter. She then led the group in an activity that highlighted the specifics of how DKG founder Dr. Annie Webb Blanton and others actually managed to start DKG back in 1929 in Texas.

Susan then took over chairing the meeting as Brenda Reese left to attend a called meeting of the Board of Education, first giving a report of the Region IX special get-together at Roaring River Vineyards followed by a brief reminder of last month's meeting minutes. Kim Shields moved adoption of the minutes, Donna Greene seconded, and the motion passed.

Treasurer Ala Moretz announced that all chapter dues and reports have finally been submitted. It was very difficult to transition to the new schedule for collecting dues, she reported. Ala noted that all annual chapter payments were complete and she reminded members that they still had a short time to sell more \$20 Auto Bell carwashes for the fundraiser in support of the chapter's Limited Endowment within the NC DKG Educational Foundation. Additionally, members were told that the chapter earned \$1060 for our volunteer work for the Blue Ridge Relay Race. Diane Ward moved to accept the treasurer's report, Carol Deal seconded the motion and the motion passed.

Following this, Maggie Christenbury, Ala Moretz and others described the various books being considered for the chapter book talk at the March 5 chapter meeting and a vote was conducted. <u>Educated</u> by Tara Westover was selected.

Susan drew members' attention to copies of Chapter Rules revisions, the Strategic Plan changes and the new Marketing Campaign. Since it was believed there was not a quorum present, attendees were told that voting would take place online. (Actually, by that time in the meeting more members had filtered in, so there was a quorum, but no vote was taken.)

The group discussed the statewide initiative of the "101 Donations" fundraiser for the NC DKG Educational Foundation. Each chapter is challenged to make twelve \$10 dollar donations.

The group is close to meeting Educational Foundation goal of \$10,000. Alpha Gamma is only \$2,451.03 shy of meeting the \$10,000 necessary to establish our own chapter limited endowment to award grants to teachers in only Avery and Watauga Counties.

On December 16, the chapter will be serving people at the Hospitality House of Boone. On January 2, 2020, the chapter will be packing bags for the beginning teachers in Avery and Watauga County.

The meeting closed with door prize drawings.
